


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
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1 More than Ever: Let's Make Our Future Green and Fair 2 3 In 2024, the 2024 European Parliament elections, the European Greens ran on a message of 4 courage. Because courage is 5 6 exactly what our politics is about right now. 7 The world in 2024 is very different from 2019. The pandemic, the wars in Ukraine and the Middle East, and deep democratic and social crises changed the world we 8 9 live in. The green transition has accelerated significantly, both in Europe and globally. But the need 10 for a continued and strengthened fight for nature and climate is evident on the backdrop of alarming reports from the IPCC record temperatures and accelerating natural disasters. More than 11 12 ever, we need ambitious answers that can meet the challenges of our times. 13 We fought the European election with our most far-reaching campaign ever, and we 14 15 have not stopped since. Building up to the elections, we put more energy than ever before into expanding the Green family, seizing the green transition as a 16 chance to build a more just society, and strengthening our alliances with 17 18 movements and civil society. 19 The European election results were mixed for the Green family. Overall, the Green family 20 experienced a loss of seats in the European Parliament compared to the previous legislature, largely due to significant setbacks in several countries. Additionally, far-right parties gained ground 21 22 in many EU member states. However, green parties made notable advances in countries where they had previously been either underrepresented or largely absent. The past five years, along with 23 the 2024 campaign and election, offer valuable lessons and opportunities for progress for the 24 European Green Party and the future of our political project. Breakthroughs in 25 many countries were tempered by major losses in others and rising far-right 26 27 forces. But, I 28 Looking beyond the numbers, the foundations for future green 29 victories have been built. These advances are the starting points for the next five years: 30 While there are still inequalities in representation, t The Green family elected MEPs from 31 more EU countries than ever before. The 32 Greens are now far better represented in southern and eastern Europe, and Baltics, a 33 34 development that strengthens and enriches us. The far right is beatable. At the EU level, we exposed far-right agenda and fought to to 39 keep them out of the majority While their gains are shocking, the far right is beatable. At the 40 EU 41 42 level, we exposed its agenda and applied the pressure necessary to keep 43 Meloni's far right of the majority. In the Nordics, the Netherlands and Italy, we bounced back and showed that Greens and progressives can win. 44 45 We have strong allies across society. We built and maintained close ties with civil society, from green and social NGOs to trade unions and businesses supporting the green 46 businesses transition. 47 During the campaign, they recognised our platform's strength and strongly 48 supported our priorities. 49 In the campaign leading up to the 2024 election, we faced several important challenges 50 51 that should serve as key areas for us to focus on in the years to come: 52 Unlike in 2019, setting the agenda on climate and environmental issues was less 53 prominent. Despite the urgency of climate disruption, there is no more mass mobilization in the streets around environmental issues. Also, electoral debates were framed around 54 economic issues of immediate and individual concern, with purchasing power dominating 55 electoral discussions all over the EU. 56 At the same time, Green parties are no longer the sole advocates for environmental issues. 57 In many European countries, we now face competition from parties that have integrated 58 climate policies into their platforms. Greens must work to ensure that our message 59 remains distinct, relevant, and credible. 60 61 After the elections, Commission President Ursula von der Leyen achieved a 62 majority with our support based on a clear promise to defend the EU European Green Deal and ensure a pro-European, democratic future for the EU. We urgently demand that the 63 European Commission upholds this decision. This promise 64 must be upheld. We strongly deplore that Ursula Von der Leyen offered the position of Vice-65 president to a member of a post-facist party. 66 Unfortunately, we have already seen how many Conservatives in the European Parliament do not 67 share their own Commission President's line. They are playing a dangerous game flirting and 68 69 voting with the far right to form an alternative, illiberal majority. Their cooperation risks rolling But 70 the dangers of Conservative and far-right cooperation are growing. Part of 71 the European People's Party is already working hand in hand with the far right 72 to roll-back green and social legislation, gambling with human rights and 73 endangering self-determination. They will enable impunity for authoritarians like Viktor Orbán, normalize Giorgia Meloni's post-fascist government, and 74 75 harden inhuman and failed migration policies. It is the same dangerous path that has brought the far right to power in several member states. 76 As Greens, our role in this mandate is to hold the political forces leading the 77 78 European institutions to account and fight back against the right-wing drift embodied in the far

- taking responsibility in the election of the Commission president <u>Ursula von der Leven</u>, we have
- 81 showedn
- ourselves ready to build bridges and compromise to prevent far right ideology and discourses of
- 83 <u>influencing EU politics as well as</u> to realise our positive agenda.

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- 85 The fight to reinforce the green transtion will not be easy but we are ready to assume leadership
- 86 and further advance the transition towards climate neutrality and healthy nature and environment
- 87 Against the threat of far-right influence, we are prepared to support an
- 88 alliance of the democratic centre but if and only if it can also advance our
- 89 political priorities and deliver for people and planet. Throughout the mandate,
- we will fight for every opening to make progress on environmental protection,
- 91 social justice and fundamental rights and democracy, guided by a postgrowth thinking, while
- 92 combating any backlash on the Green Deal and the rule of law achievements. Outside of the
- institutions, we will be building our movement at every level of power and in
- 94 every European country.
- 95 Lately, the international fora (G20, COP29, Plastic Pollution Treaty) have shown that, if international
- 96 diplomacy is still alive, the agreements tremendously lack ambition.
- Over the next five years, the key fights for the European Greens at all levels
- 98 will be:

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Defending <u>and developing</u> the European Green Deal and backing it with common European and

national <u>regulation and public</u> investment that strengthens economic prosperity and protects our societies. <u>from the climate crisis the increasingly severe effects of the climate and biodiversity crises.</u> We will support businesses to implement the Green Deal and <u>secure future investment and jobs.</u>

Fighting for ambitious international treaties that step up our actions against the climate, biodiversity loss, pollution and resources crises.

Ensuring the green transition in all aspects – including responsible and circular use of resources, elimination of chemical pollution, healthy and sustainable agriculture and food production, nature restoration and implementation of the Montreal protocol

Improving daily lives by strengthening green public services like social








119 120 121	Looking at the challenges ahead of us, we will need to fight more courage than ever to fight for our green future. There is no ignoring the many crises European societies face.  Many people are struggling to get by after hard years of the pandemic, energy
122	crisis, and economic downturn. The severity of the climate and environmental
123	crisis is unrelenting. 2024 has been the hottest year on record and this autumn
124	has seen catastrophic flooding right across Europe, with an especially tragic
125	loss of life in the Valencia region. This is why the agenda of the European Green Deal needs to be
126	strengthened in order to invest massively in renewable energy and energy infrastructure, the
127	circular economy, biodiversity and zero pollution solutions.
128	With the Russian invasion of Ukraine, war returned to Europe, threatening
129	freedom and security across the continent. There can be no turning our backs on
130	Ukraine. It is fighting for freedom and its future lies in the European Union. Russia is using ecocide
131	as a weapon of war and must bear full responsibility for that. To address this, we must urgently
132	develop scientifically grounded methods for calculating the damages caused by ecocide,
133	ensuring accountability and enabling effective restoration efforts.
134	As Greens, we support continued economic VOTE on AM 51: and military aid to Ukraine and
135	future
136	EU membership and long-term support for Ukraine's resilience, economic development,
137	sustainable reconstruction and the rule of law. Our assistance to Ukraine must enable a climate-
138	resilient
139	reconstruction, built on renewable energy, modern infrastructure, and a
140	sustainable and inclusive economy. Our support to Ukraine must ensure its future
141	prosperity and should take the form of grants not loans. We must also support democratic forces
142	that are targeted by Russian propaganda outside of the EU, such as Georgia, Moldova and Serbia,
143	ensuring we do as much as we can for EU candidate countries.
144	The explosion of violence in the Middle East is a further reminder of the horror
145	of war, the fragility of the international system and the need for the European
146	Union to step up in world politics. After the re-election of Donald Trump, we
147	stand in solidarity with everyone in the United States and globally threatened
148	by his authoritarian agenda, his plutocratic government and his climate change denialism. In a
149	world of fear, the European Union must become  a beacon of hope and move forward towards more unity, ambition and alliances
150 151	with other parts of the world.
152	For everybody who wants an ambitious European Union that answers these
152	challenges and keeps the far right out of power, the European Greens are there
154	to represent them. As a European political party, we will build on our
155	achievements and set out a new vision for the future of our societies and the
156	European project.
157	This effort will be built together with the many actors who are fighting to make

a fair and just green transition a reality and defeat the rise of the far right.





159 160	We will also strengthen our cooperation with youth movements and continue to invest in our networks connecting Greens at the local level.
161 162 163 164 165 166	As Greens, we believe that the just and fair green transition is our future. A greener society will be a more just society, with expanded public services, affordable energy bills, and healthier surroundings. We represent the conviction that it is not only possible but achievable and desirable. Step by step, a greener, fairer society that protects the rights of all can be built. As Greens, we are calling for a just transition directive.
168 169 170	As the constructive pro-climate, pro-European democratic force, we are there to advance this green project, for the European Union as at every level of political power.
171 172 173	If we stand united with our partners, a majority for the green transition, social justice, and a united European future is achievable. It is achievable in society, in every member state, and in the European Union as a whole.
174 175	We ran elections on courage, because we need courage to face the challenges of our times. Over the next five years, we will not stop fighting for it. The future is green and fair.
