#### **Explanation / Comment**

First amendment: specialization in agriculture is unnecessarily given a negative connotation here. There are also highly specialized forms of agriculture that contribute to sustainability, such as agroforestry.

Second amendment: we should not claim that farms of *any* size should be profitable, because that does not make sense economically. We believe the suggested sentence expresses the reasoning behind this statement better.
